**APPOINTMENTS AND PRESENTATIONS:** Jim Lenner of Neighborhood Strategies LLC spoke to council about any potential projects coming up that he could help with, such as the comprehensive plan. He served as city manager in Johnstown for 12 years. He helped them get \$20 million in non-city funds. He mentioned various programs and grants available, such as the Build Back Better program and an Economic Tourism grant for construction and nonconstruction and engineering programs. The first round of applications is due at the end of January. He offers on-call planning & zoning services to get communities up to a standard where they are the ones who dictate to the developers, not the other way around. He enjoys working with smaller, hands-on communities because they usually know what they want and need. Jim talked about a busing / transit program for getting people to and from work, mainly second shift because of Licking County transit's operating hours. \$250 million transit hub between communities focused on child care, jobs, transportation, and health care such as those within Licking Memorial Health Systems. Others can get into the system / web of different modes of transport. Senator Brown has earmarked \$900,000 to complete it and Buckeye Lake could become a part of it. He talked about a tourism grant that needs to be submitted by January 31st for first consideration. The money could be spent on design and planning such as eco-based tourism like a boat launch, kayak center, expanding the bike trail, business center, water, stormwater, and wastewater improvements, cultural arts and tourism facilities, accessibility enhancements, etc.

Kevin Strang was sworn in as Zoning Officer for the village by Mayor Wells.

# **COUNCIL STANDING COMMITTEE REPORTS:**

Finance Committee: Had a few meetings since the last council meeting. December 6<sup>th</sup> meeting – work groups came together with their recommendations and input for the 2022 budget that were presented to Fiscal Officer Jennifer Dennis and the changes made for Ordinance 2021-67 on tonight's agenda and they have been recommended by the Finance Committee.

Public Safety Committee: No report.

<u>Public Service Committee:</u> December 6<sup>th</sup> meeting took place where Toby Miller did a year-end review and question and answer session which has been submitted as part of the minutes binder.

<u>Rules Committee:</u> No report, however an amendment to the Council Rules will be proposed to council tonight in Unfinished Business.

Community Development Committee: An application was put in for a \$1.1 million grant to bury power lines near the entrance to the State Park and to do some brick work. Councilor Zwissler is trying to get COVID-19 test kits for anyone showing symptoms. 20 third vaccines were given out at the Harbor Community Center last week and she will try to get more available. She urges everyone to stay safe, as the number of cases are ramping up every day. She knows of 3 people who died from COVID-19 just last week.

**Personnel Committee:** Councilor Goodman could not be at the meeting tonight and the Personnel Committee meeting before the council meeting was canceled; Councilor Zwissler was acting Chair of the Personnel Committee when a Personnel meeting was called to order at 7:38pm. Before the meeting was called to order, Councilor Wolfe spoke about a shift differential pay increase for police officers and that the police and fire pay increases for 2022 (attachment to be found with Ordinance 2021-70 on tonight's agenda) need to be looked at in further detail. Toby Miller mentioned that the pay raises are set for the budget, so if the pay amounts change, the budget would also have to change. Fiscal Officer Jennifer Dennis also stated that the budget is temporary so things could be changed later, as well as the pay ordinance. During the Personnel Committee meeting, Police Chief Harget stated there were 5,000 calls for service for the police this year, and the department is down one officer, so he had asked for a \$2 an hour raise for his officers that was recommended into the budget and pay ordinance as a \$1 raise. He was advised that this would be looked at again in the coming year. He says if there were a shift differential, they would run into officers wanting to work second and third shift because it is a chance to make more money, which could be an issue. He said a shift differential could help, but making it a raise across the board could make more sense. Fire raises were brought up as well but Jennifer Dennis stated that the Fire budget is very tight. Councilor John Lemmon stated that the Fire budget needs to be looked at again in 2022. Personnel Committee members voted 3-0 (Cable, Wolfe, Zwissler) to recommend the pay ordinance 2021-70, as presented, to full council.

Personnel Committee meeting adjourned at 7:57pm.

<u>Resolution 2021-21</u> - A RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING THE MAYOR TO EXECUTE NECESSARY PAPERWORK TO HAVE THE VILLAGE OF BUCKEYE LAKE JOIN THE MID-OHIO REGIONAL PLANNING COMMISSION.

Mayor-elect Jeryne Peterson stated that the Village of Buckeye Lake is one of the few small communities that are not yet members of MORPC. The cost is about \$1,000-\$1,100 a year, based off of the number of residents in the community. MORPC opens the door for the village to be educated on where money can be found. Jeryne asked if the rules could be suspended and council vote to pass this because MORPC has already had their meeting. Councilor Zwissler said it is important to belong to this entity and that they have already helped the village receive grants. Mayor-elect Jeryne Peterson will invite someone from MORPC to the next council meeting to speak on this.

Events like this help to bridge the gap to bring positivity to kids regarding their opinions and / or experiences with the police.

Kaye Hartman asked for council to accept her resignation from the Planning and Zoning Commission, as she has been elected to fill a council seat in 2022.
