



PROJECT JUSTIFICATION:

Buckeye Lake Village is protected from the lake by a 5 mile dam on the North and West banks. The lake is good for boating and fishing but there is no public swimming or boat launching area on the Buckeye Lake side, thus we need to develop Ryan Park.

There are many children in Buckeye Lake Village that have great need of play areas. Many of these children are of low income families, handicapped and retired people that need a local place for relaxing and entertainment. This Ryan Park is away from busy highways and next door to a Youth association Building and playground. The Boy scouts use this building for their meetings on Thursday throughout the year and there is a program of parties and dances for children of all ages plus a summer program of crafts and recreation with free lunch for the children.

Our Ryan Parkhas some basic essentials for starting a park. We have: 1-Backstop for a ball diamond

2-A basketball paved court

3-a fairly good parking Lot

4-A fence separating the park from a Mobile Home Park and residential area 5-An open shelter house

6-Awell but no pump yet.

To make Ryan Park more useful, we need:


Drainage, so more of the field can be used and the park can be used sooner after a rainy spell.

Environmental Assessment

The environmental impact of the Ryan Park Improvement will be positive. The land 5 years ago was unused agriculture land grown up in weeds. The land had corn planted on it last because the cultivating ridges were still there, thus the small field was extremely rough for mowing and playing games.

With a Federal C.D.B.G. through the Licking County Commissioners and the Licking County Planning Commission before we were incorporated the foll-owing developments were planned and completed in 1981:

1- A chain link fence separating the Park land from a Mobile Home Park and other residential areas.

2-A well (No pump yet)

3-A ball diamond backstop.

4-A large paved basketball court.

5-An open shelter house and a flag pole that was donated.

The Park land abuts the overflow creek or waste weir from the overflow dam of Buckeye Lake. Some of the park land is very wet. There is some old tile that empties into the creek but are evidently plugged from years of use so the land must be tiled again. We have filled some low places and developed grassed waterways to control erosion as much as possible.

This is a wonderful location for a Park. It is centered nicelyin our village of 2771 people(1982 July 1 census adjustment) It is adjacent to a youth center building and playground which is used by many-ehildren children and families. The two parcels of land complement one another as play and recreational areas.

The Agriculture department of the United States has a motto of (Every Acre for its best use). This land is being improved for its best use. The land is flat and a row of trees along the stream makes a good wind break. After the park is tiled and developed as needed the community will be much improved.




